 - Originally, jack-o'-lanterns were made by placing candles inside hollowed out turnips, beets, or potatoes! After settling in the U.S., immigrants found pumpkins were better for making jack-o'-lanterns.

Carved in Pumpkin

Make shapely pumpkin names with your class. Have each child draw the outline of a large pumpkin on orange construction paper. Inside the pumpkin, have each student draw connecting bubble letters of her name, filling the space inside the pumpkin. Next, carefully cut out the letters, without cutting them apart. Finally, cut a green paper stem and leaf and glue them to the pumpkin name. Display the pumpkin names around the classroom.
